SUBJECT: Tenure Approval for Dr. Amanda Huron, College of Arts and Sciences

WHEREAS, Dr. Amanda Huron is a recently promoted Associate Professor of Interdisciplinary Social Sciences/Political Science who has petitioned the University of the District of Columbia (“University”) to be granted tenure in the department in which she is qualified; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to 8B DCMR §1462, Dr. April Massey, Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences (CAS), in conjunction with the faculty of the Political Science Program and the Division of Social and Behavioral Sciences, has conducted a thorough review of Dr. Huron’s background and record of achievements in teaching, scholarship and university and community service, highlights of which are set forth on **Appendix A** attached hereto, and on that basis the Dean recommends that Dr. Huron be awarded tenure; and

WHEREAS, the President has affirmed the promotion from Assistant to Associate Professor for Dr. Huron, and has further affirmed the recommendation of tenure for Dr. Huron from the Dean and the faculty of the Political Science Program and the Division of Social and Behavioral Sciences, and the President has forwarded their recommendation for award of tenure to the Board of Trustees.

Conclusion

There is no fiscal impact associated with the granting of tenure to Dr. Amanda Huron at the academic rank of Associate Professor in the College of Arts and Sciences of the University of the District of Columbia (UDC).

The Division Evaluation and Promotion Committee (DEPC) and the College Promotion and Tenure Committee (CPTC), with input from the Political Science faculty, conducted reviews and prepared reports in order to make recommendations to the Dean regarding tenure for this faculty member.

Background

A comprehensive examination of the teaching, scholarship, and service components of Dr. Huron's tenure dossier has been completed. The dossier was vetted at program, division, and college levels. It is concluded that Dr. Huron is an excellent teacher, researcher, and servant, and that her tenure application aligns seamlessly with expectations for rigor and impact in academic performance at the University of the District of Columbia.
